Guidelines for Student Exclusion and Readmission**

Condition	Exclusion/Non-Exclusion Criteria	Readmission Criteria
Chicken pox (Varicella)	Exclude infected child until all lesions are scabbed over. <i>*Report to School Nurse</i>	Student may return to school when lesions are scabbed over, usually 5-6 days after the start of the rash.
Colds, Sore Throat, or a Persistent Cough	No exclusion required <i>unless</i> child feels unwell or has a fever and/or child is unable to participate in routine school activities due to condition. <i>* Encourage student to cover cough and practice hand hygiene.</i>	Fever free for 24 hours without using any fever-reducing medications & symptoms do not interfere with routine school activities.
Cytomegalovirus (CMV)	Exclusion not required.	
Diarrhea (An increased number of loose, watery stools compared with the child's normal pattern).	Exclude if not consistent with child's normal pattern. <i>* <u>Emphasize the need for students to practice hand hygiene.</u></i>	Symptom free for 24 hours or once a doctor has cleared to return to school.
Fifth Disease (Parvovirus)	No exclusion required unless child feels unwell or has a fever. Once the child has a rash, they are no longer contagious. <i>*Pregnant women exposed to infected child should contact their physician.</i>	Fever free for 24 hours without using any fever-reducing medications.
Food Poisoning	No exclusion required unless child feels unwell, has diarrhea, or has a fever and/or child is unable to participate in routine school activities due to condition. <i>* <u>Contact School Nurse and practice hand hygiene.</u></i>	Symptom free for 24 hours.
Gastroenteritis (Giardiasis, Shigellosis, Campylobacter)	Exclude <i>* <u>Contact School Nurse and emphasize the need for students to practice hand hygiene.</u></i>	May be readmitted once diarrhea has resolved.
Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease	No exclusion required unless child feels unwell, is unable to control their saliva or has a fever.	Fever free for 24 hours without using any fever-reducing medications.
Head Lice	Only exclude children with untreated live lice.	After the first <u>proper</u> treatment.
Hepatitis A	Exclude <i>* <u>Contact School Nurse</u></i>	8 days after onset of jaundice.

Hepatitis B	Exclude <u>if case of Hepatitis B is acute.</u> <i>*Contact School Nurse</i>	May be readmitted after symptoms resolve.
HIV	Exclusion not required unless child has weeping skin lesions that cannot be covered.	Oozing wound is covered and wound drainage can be contained with a clean, dry bandage taped on all four sides.
Impetigo	Exclude if sore is oozing and cannot be covered. No Exclusion if sore can be covered or is dry & shows signs of healing.	24 hours after antibiotic treatment is started or oozing sore covered.
Influenza (Flu) Types A and B	No exclusion required unless child feels unwell or has a fever and/or child is unable to participate in routine school activities due to condition. <i>* Unless recommended by public health officials.</i>	Fever free for 24 hours without using any fever-reducing medications
Marked Drowsiness/Malaise	Exclude if child is unable to actively participate in routine school activities.	Symptom free for 24 hours.
Measles	Exclude <i>* Contact School Nurse</i> <i>* Exclude unvaccinated children until cleared by the Health Department</i> <i>* Pregnant women exposed to infected child should contact their physician.</i>	7 days after onset of the rash and cleared by the Health Department.
Meningitis	Exclude <i>*Contact School Nurse</i>	Student must be cleared by Health Care Provider.
Mononucleosis (Epstein-Barr virus)	Exclude if child is unable to actively participate in routine school activities.	Symptom free for 24 hours.
MRSA Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus	Exclude if wound cannot be covered or wound drainage cannot be contained with a clean, dry bandage taped on all four sides. No Exclusion if wound can be covered or is dry and show signs of healing. <i>*Children with lesions on uncovered skin, or lesions that are draining or oozing, even if covered, may not participate in close contact sports.</i>	24 hours after effective antimicrobial treatment is started or oozing wound is covered and wound drainage can be contained with a clean, dry bandage taped on all four sides.
Mumps	Exclude <i>*Contact School Nurse</i> <i>*Exclude unvaccinated children until cleared by the Health Department</i>	9 days after onset of parotid gland swelling and cleared by the Health Department.
Pertussis (Whooping Cough)	Exclude <i>*Contact School Nurse</i> <i>*Exclude unvaccinated children as directed by Health Department.</i>	5 days after appropriate antibiotic treatment <u>or 21 days after the onset of symptoms.</u>

<p>Pink Eye – Conjunctivitis</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Purulent Conjunctivitis • Non-Purulent Conjunctivitis 	<p>Exclude: Purulent Conjunctivitis defined as pink or red eye with white or yellow eye discharge, often with matted eyelids after sleep and eye pain or redness of the eyelids or skin surrounding the eye.</p> <p>Non-Exclusion: Non-purulent Conjunctivitis defined as pink eye with a clear, watery eye discharge without fever, eye pain or eyelid redness.</p> <p><i>*Child should be reminded to avoid touching eyes and to wash hands often.</i></p>	<p>24 hours after treatment is started or until cleared by a physician to return to school.</p> <p>Does not require exclusion.</p>
<p>Pinworms</p>	<p>No exclusion required.</p>	
<p>Rash with a fever</p>	<p>Exclude following the temperature/fever guidelines below.</p>	<p>When a health care professional has determined that the illness is not a communicable disease.</p>
<p>Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)</p>	<p>Exclusion not required *Unless in respiratory distress or meets other criteria for exclusion.</p>	
<p>Ringworm</p>	<p>Exclude at end of school day. While at school, rash needs to be covered.</p>	<p>Once treatment is started. Usually an anti-fungal cream.</p>
<p>Rubella (German Measles)</p>	<p>Exclude * <i>Contact School Nurse</i> * <i>Exclude unvaccinated students until cleared by Health Department</i> * <i>Pregnant women exposed to the infected child should contact their Physician.</i></p>	<p>7 days after the rash appears and cleared by Health Department</p>
<p>Scabies</p>	<p>Exclude until seen by a Health Care Provider and treatment initiated.</p>	<p>Once treatment is started. Usually an anti-fungal cream.</p>
<p>Shingles</p>	<p>Exclude if rash cannot be covered.</p>	<p>When all lesions have scabbed over.</p>
<p>Sores (Any lesion in a weeping stage)</p>	<p>No exclusion needed if covered and/or diagnosed as non-infectious</p>	<p>When lesion can be covered and/or diagnosed as non-infectious.</p>
<p>Strep Throat and Scarlet Fever</p>	<p>Exclude until seen by a Health Care Provider and treatment initiated.</p>	<p>24 hours after antibiotic treatment is started.</p>
<p>Temperature/Fever</p>	<p>Exclude under following temperature/fever conditions: 100 fever or > axillary (armpit) 101 fever or > orally (mouth) 102 fever or > tympanic (ear)</p>	<p>Fever free for 24 hours without using any fever-reducing medications.</p>
<p>Thrush</p>	<p>No exclusion required</p>	

Tuberculosis	Exclude if active case of TB. * Contact School Nurse	After 2-4 weeks of proper treatment and cleared by Health Department.
Vomiting/Severe Abdominal Pain	Exclude at first symptoms * <i>Severe abdominal pain should be evaluated by a healthcare provider ASAP</i>	Symptom free for 24 hours.
Warts (Human Papilloma Virus)	Exclusion not required	

Exclusions of Students Who Are Under Exemption and Conditionally Enrolled Status

Students who have claimed an exemption to all vaccines or to one vaccine or who is conditionally enrolled from school attendance if there is good cause to believe that the student has a vaccine preventable disease and:

- has been exposed to a vaccine preventable disease; or
- will be exposed to a vaccine preventable disease as a result of school attendance.

An excluded student may not attend school until the local health officer is satisfied that a student is no longer at risk of contracting or transmitting a vaccine preventable disease.

Reportable Diseases, Emergency Illnesses, and Health Conditions

Report to School Nurse or local health official any unusual or increased occurrence of any illness that may indicate an outbreak, epidemic, or bioterrorism event. Reportable emergency illnesses or health conditions of public concern include the following:

- Respiratory illness (upper and lower respiratory tract infections, difficulty breathing and Adult Respiratory Distress Syndrome).
- Gastrointestinal illness (vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain)
- Influenza-like symptoms
- Neurologic symptoms (meningitis, encephalitis, or unexplained acute encephalopathy or delirium)
- Rash illness
- Hemorrhagic illness
- Botulism-like syndrome
- Lymphadenitis
- Sepsis or unexplained shock
- Febrile illness
- Nontraumatic coma or sudden death
